On Tuesday, Nov. 10, 1950, the Board of Education approved the leasing of land from the Braille Institute to provide more parking for State College students.
The article, which carried the news in the College Times, stated: "As soon as the president of the Board of Education signs the lease, funds will be appropriated and the maintenance department will begin work on fencing and gravelling the parking lot," Well! theed at State College this term which are designed primarily for elementary a secondary teach ing candidates. The variety of "164" course numbers offered, include Drama 164, Radio and
Television 164 , Journalism 164, and Motion Pictures 164, each is represented with the aim instructing aspiring teachers in school methods of teaching
For example, Journalism 164, conducted by Paul T. Scott associate professor of Journalism, deals with the theory and techniques of school newspapers. The course is designed for credential candidates who desire an introduction to the practical problems in supervising school publications.
Drama 164, conducted by Grant E. Shepard, assistant proGrant E. Shepard, assistant pro-
fessor of Drama, presents the fessor of Drama, presents the
theory and techniques of dramatheory and techniques of drama-
tical productions in school and tical productions in school and
community theatres. It is designcommunity theatres. It is design-
ed for General Credential candidates.
Radio \& Television 164 and Motion Picture 164 are designed for Elementary \& Secondary candidates and also for parents. Emphasis is on the social, psychological, and educational importance of radio, television and
motion pictures for children of motion pictures for children of
elementary and high school age.
Motion Pictures 164 deserves special mention because it is
unique in its offering. It is the only course of its kind in the country. Because of this fact, a new system of approach was needed for presentation this semester. Since there was no previous work done in the formulation of such a course, new ideas and methods had to be devised.

Alfred Ehrhardt, assistant professor of English, accepted the tremendous responsibility of planning, organizing and conducting the course program. By the method of class discussions, and contributions, a groundwork of ideas, inspirations, and procedures were developed. Through his own re-
search, collecting of data, and search, collecting of data, and
arranging of materials, Ehrhardt formulated a thoroughly interesting and completely organized course. This he accomplished in a short span of a few weeks. Included in the course study outline are: (1) The History of the Motion Pictures, (2) Psychology and Social Effects of the Motion Pictures on Children, (3) Specific Types of
Motion Pictures, (4) Methods Motion Pictures, (4) Methods of Evaluation of Motion Pictures. The course includes many other aspects and concepts of the theatre, radio and television. The trend in teacher training is becoming broader in scope. Ehrhardt defines the situation very appropriately in his statement. "Teacher training has grown in technical complexities
to the degree where it is no to the degree where it is no longer sufficient for the prospective teacher to become a subject-matter specialist. In addition, he must now become familiar with a rapidly enlarging field of pedagogics."

The other (Vittorio Gassmann) spends his time chasing Silvana and plotting to steal the rice harvest. Along the way is a good deal of down to earth violence: Silvana gets birched on a road-
side, Doris is nearly mobbed as a scab by her fellow workers, and Gassmann is ampaled on a meat hook during a fight in a butcher shop.

The Diablos pulled away in the second stanza and won "going away like a good thing." Pomona hit for five digits in the first ten minutes of the final period, while State was feeding the hoop with 20.
In quick succession Dick Schlessinger and center Leo Guzik scored seven straight points. Backboard control on the part of Gurian and Green was
one of the contributing factors in Pomona failing to score in the remaining minutes of the tussle.
With the score 39-24, Green made good on four straight buckets. He fed the hoop with a jump shot from the key, a push from the same position, a hook from the right side, and an eight foot pusher from the side.
In the final minutes of play Bob Woods added six points for the losers. Sparks and Guzik ended the scoring parade with a lay-up shot and two free throws respectively.
Next game for the Diablo squad will be Saturday night when State faces its toughest opponent of the season in the Trojans from the University of Southern California. The contest will start at 8 o'clock in the Troy gym.

Green holds about every local scoring record possible. He sank 334 points last year for an all 334 points last year for an all
time high, averaged 13.2 digits per-game, and set a single game per-game, and set a single game
