

Diablos Meet Mustangs In Initial Hoop Tiff

Horse-Trainer J. B. Stull will herd some fifteen head of Cal-Poly Mustangs onto the basketball floor of the City College gym Friday evening at eight in an effort to trample a fiery band of State College Diablos back to whence they came.

State's President Dr. P. Victor Peterson will risk being trampled or speared as he tosses up the first ball to initiate State's athletic program.

Vie For Start

With each man eager for the honor of starting, the Devils

have made it rough on Coach Shaw to select a starting five. Wayne Scott, Bob Dittmar, and Wayne Hanks are all fighting for the nod at the two forward posts. Chase Edmunds, Marian Kohel, and Paul Ludford are battling for the center spot. Ray Garcia, Jim Hanley, Duff Means, and Ed Sparrow are looking good at the guard positions.

Dr. Shaw points out that these men have worked together longer than others on the squad; he fully expects others that have been hindered by outside work, injuries and illness to push themselves to the front as the season progresses.

Coach John Shaw's locals are fired up and have planned a hot reception for the visiting horsemen. Chief Devil Shaw has found time between extensive drills on fundamentals to work out five offenses to spring on the opposition.

Which offense and what personnel to be used will depend upon what type of defence the invaders set up. Three different types of defense, each designed to stop a particular offensive style, have been installed. The Diablos have no intention of letting State's first athletic team go down, down to defeat, that is in their initial test.

Card Holders Free

State students holding Student Body cards will be admitted free. City College Student Body cards will admit holders for thirty-cents, other spectators will be charged sixty-cents at the door.

When pressed for a definite starting line-up, Coach Shaw gave out with double talk, hedging, and "ifs" for a half-hour admitting that a "possible, tentative line-up will probably include" Scott and Hanks at forwards, Edmunds at center, and Garcia and Hanley at guard.

Diablo Dribble Follows Casaba Caper

In order to demonstrate student body backing of the first athletic team, the Sports and Recreation Club is taking over the City College Student Union and sponsoring the "Diablo Dribble" dance immediately following State's opening basketball game with California Polytechnic Institute of San Dimas on December 3rd.

Decorations of the hall will simulate a spot in the center of an inferno in keeping with the nickname of the college, Diablos, which is Spanish for devils.

From the President on down, the faculty has joined in the spirit of the affair and are working for its success. Dr. P. Victor Peterson, State College President, will toss up the first ball to start the game. Dr. Esther Penchef, dean of women, will supervise the work of the Hostess Club in ushering at the game.

Pep Band Leads

As soon as the game ends, all (censored) will break loose. The pep band will then sound off and lead a serpentine. The line will wind about the campus and cross the bridge over the River Styx before entering the Student Union. Devils, complete with pitchforks, will prod the procession along its way and discourage any would-be wanderers.

Honored guests at the dance will be the visiting Mustang basketball team and their coach.

Tickets are on sale on campus and will also be available at the door. Those holding State or City College student body cards will be admitted for thirty cents. Others will be charged sixty cents.

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State Emphasizes Service

Scoring a bullseye on the target of educational requirements is an important aspect of the State College education department program which stresses coordination between training offered in preteaching classes and the Los Angeles city schools' policies and practices. This correlation is the result of frequent conferences between State educators and the supervisors, principles and administrative staff of the city and county Boards of Education.

State is emphasizing service to the metropolitan area in its training program which hopes to prepare a major share of teachers who meet the requirements of the Los Angeles system in order to fill the 10,000 vacancies expected between 1949 and 1955. According to Mr. Leland Baldwin, of the personnel section of the Los Angeles City Board of Education, 6000 elementary and 4000 secondary teachers will be required.

Needs of in-service teachers are met at State by special evening classes designed to fulfill requirements for the professional growth point salary system, credentials and degrees. Expansion of the day program is contingent upon demand and necessary facilities.

Another significant indication of the growth of State College is the proposed plan to seek additional training schools for practice teaching since applications for next semester exceed Lockwood's capacity. Dr. John Morton, dean of education, pointed out that nearby schools under the same arrangements as we have with Lockwood School will be chosen in the near future. "We are going to take a middle-of-the-road course at State by teaching the best of the proven practices of education today," affirmed Dr. Morton. "We are not experimenting, nor do we plan to experiment with any radical ideas."

Underlining State's education policy, Mr. Baldwin explained that the Los Angeles system uses the modern school approach which adopts the best from various education philosophies. "We are progressive in as much as we have an open mind and a desire to improve. However, many teachers from other regions who have incorrectly heard that we pursue a progressive policy, in the limited sense of the word, have a sad awakening when they receive their test results. They give the answer they think the board wants, rather than the one based on common sense and insight which is the approved answer."

The cooperation between State College and the Los Angeles school system is resulting in the preparation of teachers admirably qualified to teach in the metropolitan area and to fill the great need which exists and will continue to exist. It is a program which wins the whole-hearted support of students who quicken to the words of Cicero, "What better or greater gift can we offer than to teach and instruct our youth."

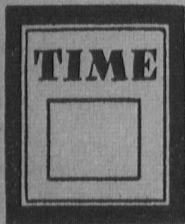
Service Club Initiates New Meeting Plans

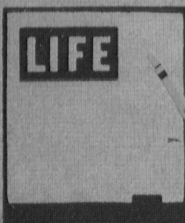

A mock oral interview was demonstrated with Mr. Baldwin, Dr. Chester Milham and Dr. Hugh S. Brown acting as the interviewing board, and Maria Louise Montoya, State graduate student, playing the role of interviewee.

Highlighting the business part of the meeting was a debate regarding the adoption of two resolutions to be presented to the C. T. A. in an attempt to win their support in the state legislature. Unanimously passed was a resolution to ask that California state colleges be accredited to grant master's degrees.

A motion to ask C.T.A. backing in speeding up action for the removal of State College to a permanent campus was deferred until tomorrow's meeting. The deferral was to allow time to gather more complete information on available funds and sites. Robert Stinson, vice president of the C. S.T.A., heads the committee which volunteered to obtain the requisite information.

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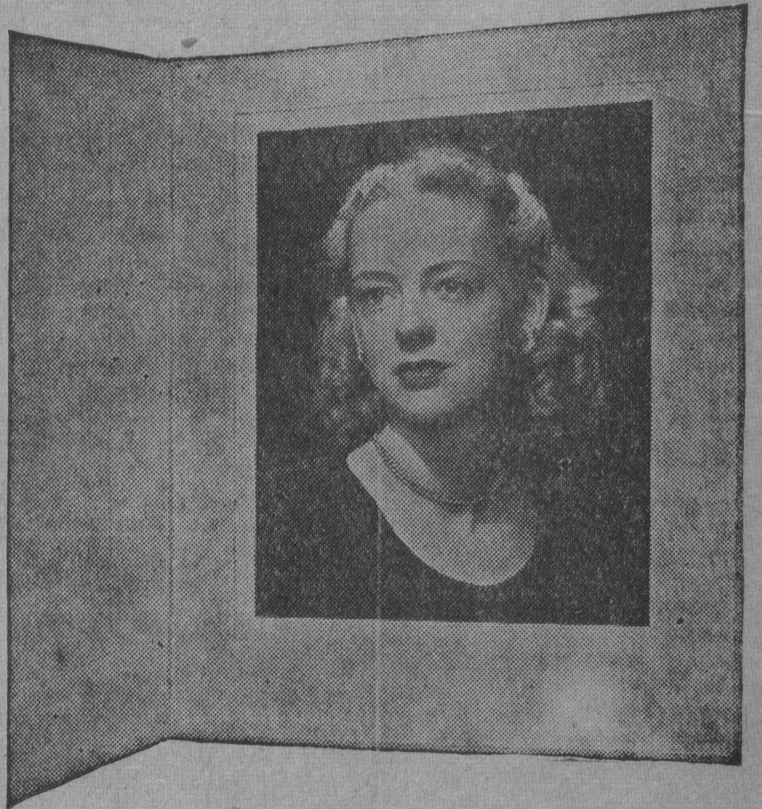

Recently Bahr was appointed as recreation specialist to serve in the Southern California area. His primary work is to give particular attention to recreation problems in the coastal counties of Los Angeles, Ventura, Santa Barbara, and San Luis Obispo. His headquarters are established at the Los Angeles office of the recreation commission.

Previous to this appointment, he held the position of superintendent of recreation in Huntington Park for three years. At the request of Sterling S. Winans, director of recreation for the State of California, the city council released him of his duties in order to take over his job. He served as recreation executive in Iowa and spent five years service with the Federal Security Agency as a recreation consultant in the inter-mountain states.

His background fits him to assist communities in planning community-wide recreation programs.

A graduate of Indiana University with majors in recreation and education, Bahr has contributed articles to professional magazines and has published pamphlets on many phases of recreation, one of his pets has been the preparation of colored films on recreation activities.
