Legislative action for State Bill underway in final formal procedure

SACRAMENTO, April 1: — Last night, the Senate Education Committee voted unanimous approval for a Los Angeles State College of Applied Arts and Sciences

College of Applied Arts and Sciences.

Assembly bill 111 was presented by Assemblyman Glenard P. Lipscomb, L.A. Following Lipscomb's presentation, Roy E. Simpson, Superintendent of Public Instruction, California State Department of Education, added amendments which gave to the State full control and support of the new institution. Mechanics of operation will follow along previously established State College lines. Curricula needs of all groups will continue to be met.

Senator Chris N. Jesperson, chairman of the Senate Education Committee and author of the State College bill, commended Simpson, Douglass, Petersen, Stoddard, Lipscomb, the University of California, and all other parties concerned in the compromise.
