discusses problems

Mr. Patrick Palace, Chief of the Juvenile Division, Los Angeles County Probation Department, recently addressed the class on Social Problems (Sociology 102). Mr. Palace is a former director of the Los Angeles Juvenile Hall and has spent 24 years in the field of delinquency control and youth guidance.

He stressed the need of utilizing the total resources of the community in meeting the needs of its young people. As enlightened citizenry is needed to provide more adequate facilities for deliquent, defective, and deserted children, job opportunities are always good in this field, Palace said.

The course is taught by Dr. James B. Wilson, Associate Professor of social science.



Within a few weeks student body members will be called upon to vote for or against the first proposed constitutional amendment. The purpose of this addition is to provide a term of office for the elected officers.

As approved by the executive council the proposal calls for a one year term for the president, vice-president, representative-atlarge, men's rep. and women's rep., and semesterly terms for class

A good deal of controversy has already arisen over this problem. Both sides have many legitimate arguments. Those in opposition say that a year is too long; not enough people are given an opportunity to participate; etc.


Because I am for the bill, I will attempt in the next few weeks to put across my viewpoint.

Activity programs must of necessity be set up on a yearly basis if any type of efficiency is to be maintained. This year has been a good example of the loss of time caused by semesterly changes of officers. It took two months to set up and approve a budget for the second semester. During the intervening period only a minimum of activities could be provided. If more of the council members had been experienced in this kind of operation there would have been a great saving of time (and probably effort).

Business firms have been reluctant to do business with colleges because of the frequent change of officers. By providing a core of yearly office holders we are making ourselves more attractive to outside business.

Some appointed officers must hold their positions for a year. For instance, the editor of Pitchfork must be on an annual basis. If the elected representatives are not on such a basis, many appointments may be forced on them.

Because of the validity of the argument that more people should be given opportunities to hold office, the proposal provides that half of the officers will be on a yearly basis and half will hold office for a semester. Thus continuity is given to the body while more people are allowed to participate.



There will be put to the students in the very near future, a proposed amendment to the constitution. That amendment if passed by the student body, will, in effect, give one year's tenure to all members of the executive council except class officers.

On the surface, this may appear to expedite student activities. To some extent that may be true, however, it does not allow for certain emergency contingencies. There is a recall clause in the constitution, but it is practically impossible to impose it. You see, it would take a two-thirds vote of the student body to recall a member, but if you can manage to get two-thirds of the students to ever get close to a ballot box, let alone voting to recall, you're doing something that's not short of a miracle. So if a poor councilman were elected for a year (and that may happen) you are stuck!

If you remember that a student body officer may run for reelection, there may be no need for an officer to have a year's

Arguments in favor of this amendment declare that it takes time for the council to draw up a good substantial budget. However, there will have to be a new budget each and every semester since students purchase their student body membership at that time.

You cannot with any accuracy determine at the beginning of one semester what money will come into coffers for the following term. Therefore a year in office will not help one whit towards this end.

states that after one semester a councilman notner argumei will be better qualified and experienced to carry on his executive duties. But there is also the contention that if you're lousy one semester, you can be lousy, and perhaps more so, the next time out.

One other contention. This reporter believes more alternatives should have been allowed the students. If they were to vote in the negative, LASC officers may remain in office indefinitely since no provision was made for tenture in the constitution. The executive council may then pass a by-law to the constitution stating tenure of office. However, there is no check on the executive council. They may put into the by-laws exactly what was in the amendment even if the majority of students voted in the negative on the proposal. Why couldn't more alternatives be allowed? Perhaps students want all their officers to hold tenure for only one semester, or perhaps, the president have one year in office while other members one semester. You figure it out!

The College Times will not, as has been rumored, change its name to "that other publication on campus," nor for that matter to "the College Crimes."
