Black and gold drapes Devils; Practice begins

With basketball season just around the corner, it appears that Coach Wild Bill "Buck" Shaw is the man of the hour. He's been selected to take the reins as head of the devil cage crew for the second year running.

It seems like only yesterday that Coach Shaw's gold and black clad warriors trotted on to the City College hardwood amid the frolicking of the State College band and the turbulent roars of the packed gymnasium to meet the Cal Poly Mustangs from San Dimas. That day will always signify the spirit of Los Angeles State as the Diablos proceeded to make State's athletic debut a triumphant one as they drubbed the visitors 34-29 to the complete delight of the highly participant crowd.

Getting back to Mr. "Buck" Shaw, it is apparent that he will again have his work cut out for him. Practice will be held, as last year, in the City College gym, from 7 p.m. Once more conflicts are bound to set in, as working hours, studying, or numerous other hindrances, but nevertheless, State is destined to field its basketball team.

Outlook for this season seems to be exceedingly brighter. Dr. Shaw will have the big guns, Wayne "Smackover" Scott and "Hammering" Wayne Hanks from last year's contingent to help spearhead the attack along with such talent as Marv "Gooch" Gurian, Ed "Sharpie" Sparrow, Big Duff Means, Jerry Jacobson, "Big Ten", Chase Edmonds, Fred "Race Horse" Sutton, and six other returning lettermen.

A number of City College stalwarts including Jack Sparks, Dick Green, Ed "Mad Russian" Goorjian, and Leo Guzik will likely add to the caliber of the Diablos.

Although the staters won but four of 14 contests last season, the spirit was high, and if that spirit is evident in this year's squad, a few teams on the devil schedule could be very definitely surprised. However, only time will tell, and the first game is tentatively set for early October against Cal Poly, on the home court.

Wilson named to library post

Mr. Gordon W. Wilson new State College head librarian, is a native son of California. He received his B. A. degree at the Univ. of California at Berkeley, and later attended library school on that campus for three years.

During World War II Mr. Wilson worked in the Kaiser Shipyards at Richmond. In 1944, he attended John Hopkins University, Maryland as a member of the library staff, and received his M. A. degree in the writing, speech and drama department in June, 1949. Wilson returned to California during the same month.

The new librarian announced the State Library will now remain open until 9 P.M. Mondays through Thursdays, to better serve night students.

The head librarian informs us that the library is understaffed, but with physical conditions as they are, no more employees can be hired. The library will run out of book space by the end of the year, so that it will be necessary to enlarge facilities in some manner.

Mr. Wilson's staff includes a senior librarian yet to be appointed, Miss Heid, reference and circulation librarian; Miss Hegle, new order librarian; and Miss Ehrenwerth, clerical assistant. Five student assistants include Leroy Lincoln, Velma Rabb, Nina Pena, Dolores Lavery and Jack Lawrence.

Truth, integrity, dignity essential to success

Expected to become one of the leading educational institutions in the country the Los Angeles State College assumes its permanent legal status on October 1.

Personal interviews with the top education men in the state revealed their high aspirations for this state college. The extra type of applied training afforded for business and industry makes us unique in that there are few schools that offer such work along with their liberal arts courses.

Created by an act of the legislature in 1947 LASC has grown by leaps and bounds graduating in its three classes 7, 28, and 150 successively and growing from 167 students to some 2500.

The propaganda, bickering, distortions of the truth and extended assumptions which have accompanied our growing pains most now of necessity come to an end. If we are to rise to our aspired heights the truth must be accepted and aims towards harmonious relations extended.

Assembly Bill (AB) 111 created the Los Angeles State College of Applied Arts and Sciences which is for a certain period to be located on this campus and will lease said facilities from the city. (The arrangement is probably much the same as the one that has existed for two years). The junior college is not to be extended into the state college; the state college is not to swal-

low up the junior college, and the two institutions are in no way to become one. There are very definitely two institutions housed at 855 N. Vermont Ave. There's no mistaking this, no argument and no bluff. The state college is State College, the junior college, City College. Until such time as there are adequate facilities the state college will have only a junior, senior and graduate year. When there are facilities then we will have a lower division.

This institution was created to serve those seeking an education. They should be deprived of nothing. It is important that one's college days be surrounded with all sorts of beauty, with very wonderful memories of terribly important days. It is up to us to see to it that these conditions be fulfilled. As citizens and voters it is our duty. As alumnus we should never lose contact with our school.

It is with eager eyes that we look forward to the day when our school will be housed on a campus of its own, to the time when we can point with pride to something which we had a part in building.

Here's wishing the new president the very best of luck. I am sure he will soon know his students body is the tops.

And most of all here's wishing the city of Los Angeles is big enough to let our state college grow and truly materialize into one of our very nicest dreams. —L.B.

Council moves ahead with many ideas

Betty Engel, commissioner of activities, reported on the progress of the proposed dance, Harvest Hop.

Barclay Hood, junior class president, reported on a project of having small State College Stickers printed. He was asked to investigate further.

A three man committee was appointed to tabulate the student interest questionnaires.

Norma Karns, secretary, read a letter addressed to Wayne Hanks and signed by Mr. Gordon Wilson, librarian, which pledged cooperation with the student body.

'Life with Father' to offer fine direction

"Life With Father," first limelighter to be staged on campus this season, will be blessed with quality direction. Since the first day that "Thin" Bob Shinn was selected to do the chore he has constantly been acquainting himself with the background motivations of the Lindsay-Crouse characters. He has studied their relationships to politics, religion, and one another. Aside from this direction-handbook preparation the "Thin Man" has been chuckling and gurgling to himself . . . the play is that funny. I guess this is one we can't miss.

"The Respectful Prostitute" by Jean Paul Sartre, is a well penned drama that oozes with potent possibilities. Sartre gnaws into the evils and weaknesses of humanity. He colorfully develops character symbols that rub raw influences, one against the others, in one of society's attics of decay. The only unforgivable weakness in this beautiful script has to do

with its trite tag ending. Of course this pointless ending may have been injected into the script after it left Sartre's hand -I don't know. Nevertheless, it does exist in the current Coronet version. After the characters have been built up to classic heights they are given musical - comedy crutches to fade out upon.

The polite second night audience was unresponsive and certainly had reason to be. There is more to acting than good memory work. Any fine script needs a good director and some fine actors to bring it to life. I'm distressed to say that the entire production lacked the necessary imagination and motivation. It came across in a mass of surface values and was not brought to life.

Incidentally, playwrights looking for a showcase for their material may submit their scripts to the New Studio, located on New Hampshire near Hollywood Blvd., and the directors will give every play receiving a fair reading.

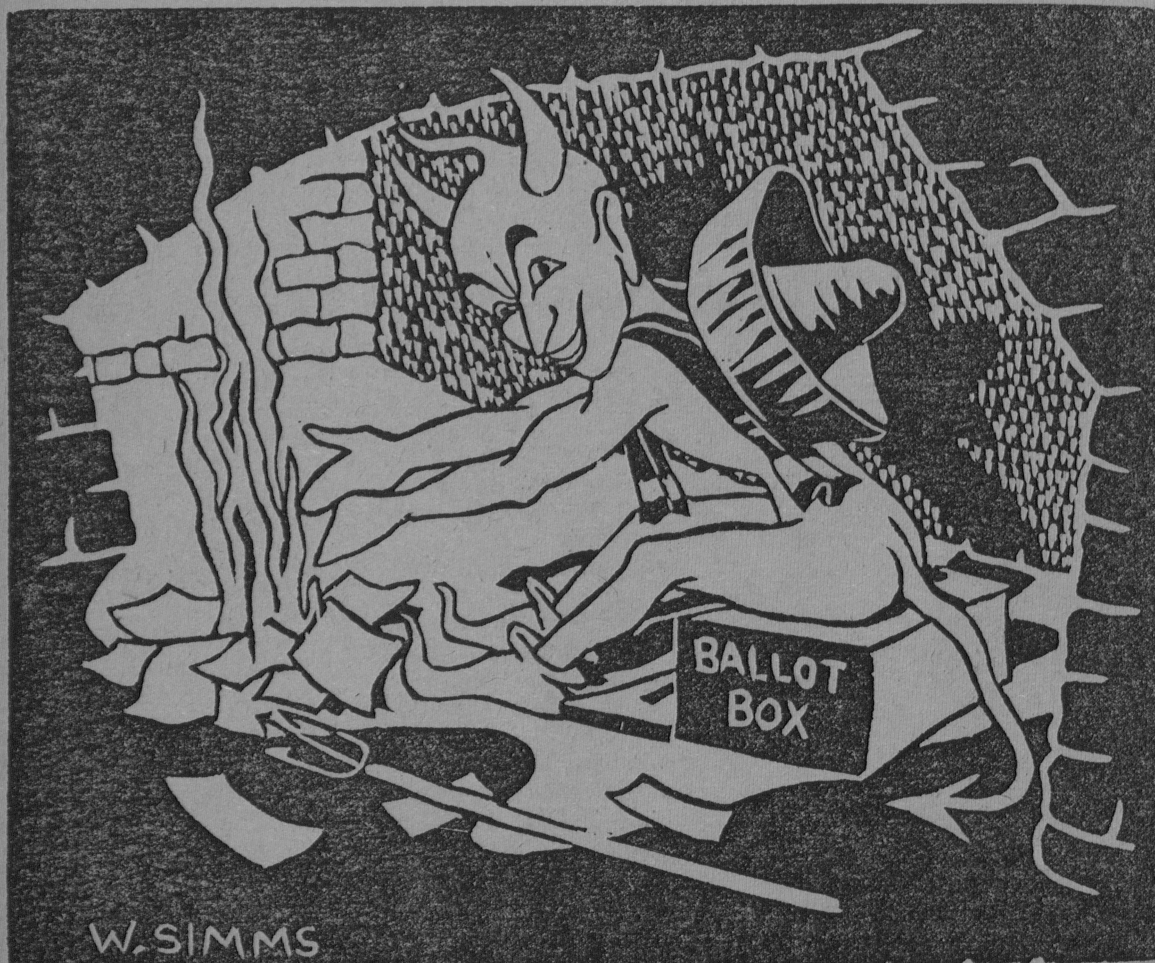

The good doctor started his career at North Central High School in the state of Washington where he was selected on the All-State team as forward. This quintet won the State Championship for three years running, and was coached by Jack Friel, who is now head coach at Washington State College located at Pullman, Washington. From there he was a member of the USC team for four years under Sam Barry. For two years Dr. Shaw mentored the B squad at Poly High School, and four years coached in A.A.U. circles.

Intramural control board sets rules for program

These are the rules and regulations governing intramural athletics as set up by the Intramural Board of Control. These regulations cover the whole intramural program and not specific sports. All clubs must abide by these rules during intramural participation.

1. Participation is limited to the associated student body of Los Angeles State College.
2. Organized student body groups and unaffiliated students may enter as a team or as individuals in all intramural activities.
3. Student groups must appoint a sports representative to gather all information required by the Board of control.
4. All rules and policies will be drawn up by the Board of Control.
5. The Board of Control is composed of (1) Commissioner of Athletics, (2) Men's Coordinator, (3) Women's Coordinator, (4) Men's Faculty Advisor, (5) Women's Faculty Advisor.
6. Lettermen of State College cannot compete in their letter sport.
7. The Order of Satan cannot compete as a unit.
8. A student can play for one group ONLY during a semester.
9. Appropriate rules of a sport will govern for each intramural activity.
10. Scoring of teams will be on a point system.
11. Points will be totaled in each sport and the team having the most points at

the end of the semester will be the winner.

12. Point scoring will be as follows: 5 points for each participant, 5 points for winning an event as a team, 1 point for losing an event as a team, 10 points bonus for being champion, 1 point penalty per man signed who has not played in at least one game, 3 points penalty for forfeiting.
13. All protests must be filed in writing to the Board of Control in order to be acted upon.
14. An activity will be dropped if interest is not sufficient in the opinion of the Board of Control.
15. A roster of the players participation in an activity MUST be submitted to the Board of Control before that team can play.

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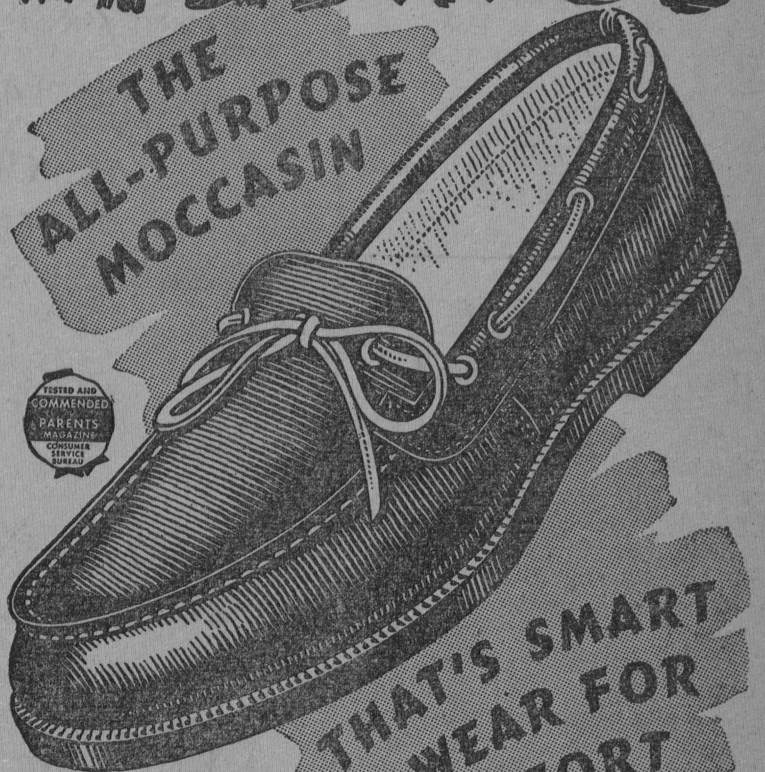
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First womens tea proves successful


