A grave problem has arisen. Doesn't it always?-However, this is so pertinent and concerns the student body to such a great extent that an immediate solution is necessary.

There has been talk that College Times should become a biweekly publication. Reason for this arrangement is so that there would be a paper on this campus every day. On the surface this may sound very good but I for one will never be sold on the worth of such an arrangement. In short, it boils down to selling you students out. . . I'll elaborate a little.

In the first place we have about 2500 students of which 800 are ASB members and maybe 900 fulltime day students. In colleges with twice this enrollment it is seldom that there is more than one publication a week. (I think the University of Alabama will serve as one slight example.) Why? Because once a week allows for adequate news coverage, and also, the added expense is not such that it's merited.

Why should State students be forced to allocate an unjust amount of their money which could be spent on activities which would give you something for your money. I can safely guarantee that increasing this paper to a bi-wekly publication would cost the student body an added \$1000 per semester-if it were possible to acquire the additional ads which would be necessary.

Now then, just who is College Times supposed to serve? In the proposed plan we would be printing City College news and vice versa. Why? I could tell you but it'd take a few pages, and besides I've said it all before.

Well, it's up to you. You're paying and have a right to speak for the way your money is spent.

Let's do what's right.

The theatre season in greater Los Angeles is going along with much activity. Every stage is full but there are seats that sit alone. In other words the jingling sounds of would-be theatre-goers are confined to bread and egg buying. It's the same way during, and after Xmas each year. But let's look at the quality of the shows on the western boards. When the curtain came up on "HONEST JOHN" at the Las Palmas Theatre, Buddy Ebsen, a musical comedy hoofer, became a straight actor. There was no motivation for dancing within the confines of the plot. All in all, he did an honest job as "Honest John." The play revolves around a young married man who is a builder and designer. He gets mixed up in some crooked political arrangements and has a hard time holding on to his honest character. The standout in the cast was Virginia Vincent as "Red Devlin" the nymphomaniac. She has a consistent and vital characterization. Watch her, she'll be a star in the future.

Then, the interplay between James Burke and Henry Corden must be brought up for praise; it is excellent. Mr. Burke is known by most of us as a friendly Irish cop. That's his stock character in pictures. He seemed to enjoy his role of Commissioner Michael Malloy in this production because he

turned in better than fair performance. Henry Corden is probably the most up and coming extreme-character man on the Los Angeles theatre scene. His sense of timing is perfect; and he pulled laugh after laugh from the audience. So, if you attend the Las Palmas, you can be sure that Ebsen, Burke, Vincent, and Corden will entertain you properly. William Talman's direction doesn't help the play much and in the cop race toward the end of the play his direction is downright bad. The new play was written by Buddy Ebsen and could use a rewrite job.

G. In all matters not specifically covered in this document this Committee shall act in an advisory capacity only. This Committee may initiate any proposal for additional areas or programs of cooperation.

1. Any proposal so initiated is subject to the ratification of each respective Student Body government.

V. Finances of this Committee.

A. All finances of this committee shall be prorated on the basis of the number of Student Body Cards sold by the respective Student Bodies.

B. The Committee shall submit a semesterly budget to the Executive Council of each Student Body.

C. Any funds remaining at the end of each semester will revert to the respective Student Bodies at the same ratio as was

VI. Amendments.

A. This document may be amended only by an affirmative vote of the majority of the members of each Associated Student Body taken seperately.

VII. The provisions herein contained shall be considered in effect on the approval of this proposal by a simple majority of the voting members of each respective student body when presented to them at the next general elecitons


