## Lipscomb outlines program to faculty

"A multi-storied building program, designed to enlarge the physical capacity of Los Angeles State College, is at present under consideration," declared state assemblyman Glenard Lipscomb Thursday, Oct. 9, at a meeting of the faculty association

Speaking before a capacity audience, Mr. Lipscomb maintained "there are no plans contemplated to change the present dual set-up into a 4 year state college." He further explained that state auditors are currently comparing the curriculum of the two schools and considering the possibility of duplication of equipment by the two colleges. A complete report will be made available when this study is completed.

Mr. Lipscomb, assemblyman from the 56th district and direct representative of both State and City Colleges in the legislature, has the distinction of being a member of the Legislative Ways and Means Committee and the Joint Legislative Budget Committee, both very important to the future of State College.

In referring to the problem of adequate housing for State College, Mr. Lipscomb explored the possibility of excessive rental charges for City College property, and said, "The possibility of using state funds to purchase additional land should not be precluded."

Dr. Donald Mortensen, president of the LASC faculty association, expressed the pleased reaction of the assembled educators when he stated that the State College faculty association hoped to have further opportunity to work together with Mr. Lipscomb.

"I appreciate being invited to speak to the State College faculty and look forward to returning," said Mr. Lipscomb.

### Auditions start for TV show

Approved this week by Dr. Howard S. McDonald, the plans for a weekly TV program proposed by the Language Arts Division will begin auditioning interested students on Tuesday, Nov. 21, at 4 pm, in SA 101.

Ultimately intended as a public service, this experimental program is designed to present, in attractive format, educational resources available for successful "human engineering."

An attempt will be made to avoid set lectures, panels, and classroom situations in the preparation of original scripts.

Maximum opportunities to participate throughout the program will be given students. Professional standards are expected to prevail. Instructors experienced in TV writing and production will be in charge of the program.

A survey of the TV industry currently is under way in order to allow participating students to coordinate their school work with actual experience under the auspices of the Alternate Work-Study Program.

# Dr. Rodee lectures on Foreign Policy

Dr. Carlton C. Rodee, professor of political science at USC, in his lecture on "The Nature of Foreign Policy", stressed factors and forces which in the long run affect foreign policy.

Among the items stressed by Dr. Rodee which affect foreign policy were geographical location, natural resources, population policies, and ideology. He further expressed the belief that the power of a nation must be balanced with its commitments and that domestic and foreign policy are inseparable.

Dr. Rodee defined foreign policy as overall economic, political, military, and ideological strategy which has as its object national unity.

Moderated by Dr. Ake Sandler, the lecture, second in a series on foreign policy, jointly sponsored by the Division of Social Science and Pi Gamma, Social Science honorary fraternity, was well attended by students and faculty.

The luncheon served in the Student Union immediately following the lecture permitted students and faculty to meet and talk informally with Dr. Rodee.

Diablo water poloists wind up their season today at 4 pm when they invade the Huntington Park High School pool for a league tilt with the East Los Angeles Junior College Huskies. The Staters will be trying to establish clear title to third place in loop standings.

Occidental and Cal Tech are fighting for first and second place. The local mermen have two wins and two losses to date and are tied for third with the Huskie squad.

The Devils again turned back Cal Poly San Dimas by thumping the Broncos 12-2 in the State pool, Tuesday. They previously rang up an 11-1 victory over Cal Poly.

Highlight of the contest came at the close of game when Harold Venger hit the net for the only goal he has scored in his entire collegiate career. Coach Bud Wise switched Venger from his goal guarding position to a forward spot at the beginning of the fourth quarter when the locals led 10-0. He received a pass and tallied just as the gun sounded.

The switch did cost the Diablos though. While Venger was adding one counter the Broncos fired their two lone tallies by Louis Jones, forward, who had made the position switch with Venger. Venger charges the loss of a shutout to Jones.

Bill Ramsey and Jones shared scoring honors by tallying four goals apiece. Ramsey scored three in the first period and added another in the third. Dick Fletcher, John Jones and Sheldon Munach added one apiece.


