## Juniors excused for meet to cast ballots for officers

Juniors will be dismissed from all classes at 3 p.m. today for a class meeting in the Student Union, announced Bill Anton, Junior president. Purpose of the meeting will be to discuss future activities, and the election of officers.

Dr. Howard S. MacDonald, president, will address the group, along with the sponsor of the class, John Swartz.

"Junior vice-president, secretary, and several other offices are still open for nomination," Anton reported. "There will also be many positions open on the committee for the coming Prom and Junior Day."

A program for competitive activities between juniors and seniors will also be taken up at the first meeting. Juniors will discuss plans for a challenge.

"The Junior Class, because of its size and potentialities, should be one of the most active classes in the history of the college," Anton added. "If students will please sign up for the committees in which they are interested, the committees will function sooner, and plans for activities will be put into action."

Following the discussion, the class will be served refreshments, he said.

## Teachers meet for orientation

Elementary education majors must attend an orientation meeting Monday, Oct. 16 at 3 p.m. in Chem. 3, according to an announcement by Dr. Fred M. Tonge, education department chairman.

Dr. Tonge also announced the Los Angeles City School written examination will be administered Monday, Nov. 7, in Chem. 3, 3 p.m.

Applications for taking this examination must be turned in at the education office, Ad. 221 by Tuesday, Oct. 4.

All elementary education majors who will be eligible for teaching next semester will be excused from classes or directed teaching to attend these two meetings.

Only students who are assured of having completed their degree and/or credential requirements by the beginning of next semester will be eligible to take the examination.

Single student body cards for married couples were given final approval in the executive council meeting of Monday, Oct. 2.

Under this measure, originally proposed by Al Baron, representative-at-large, married student couples may purchase a single card, entitling them to admittance as a couple to athletic events, dances, etc., but entitling them to only one *Pitchfork* and one vote in elections.

Married couples, both members of whom are veterans, will be required to hold two cards in order to buy books and supplies at the Associated Students Book Store. However, it will be possible for one of them to buy a special student card for \$1.

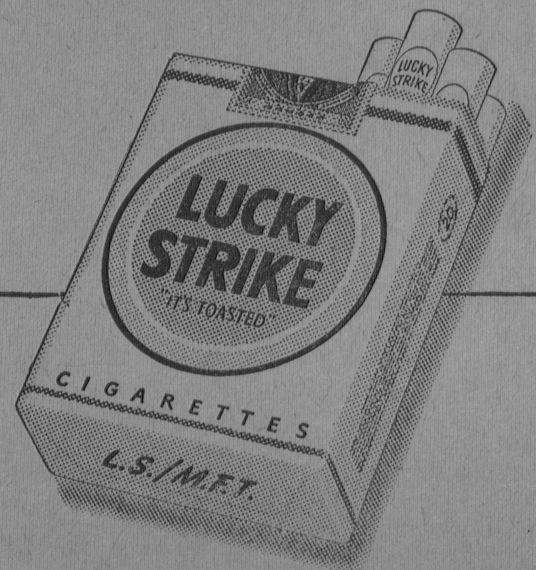

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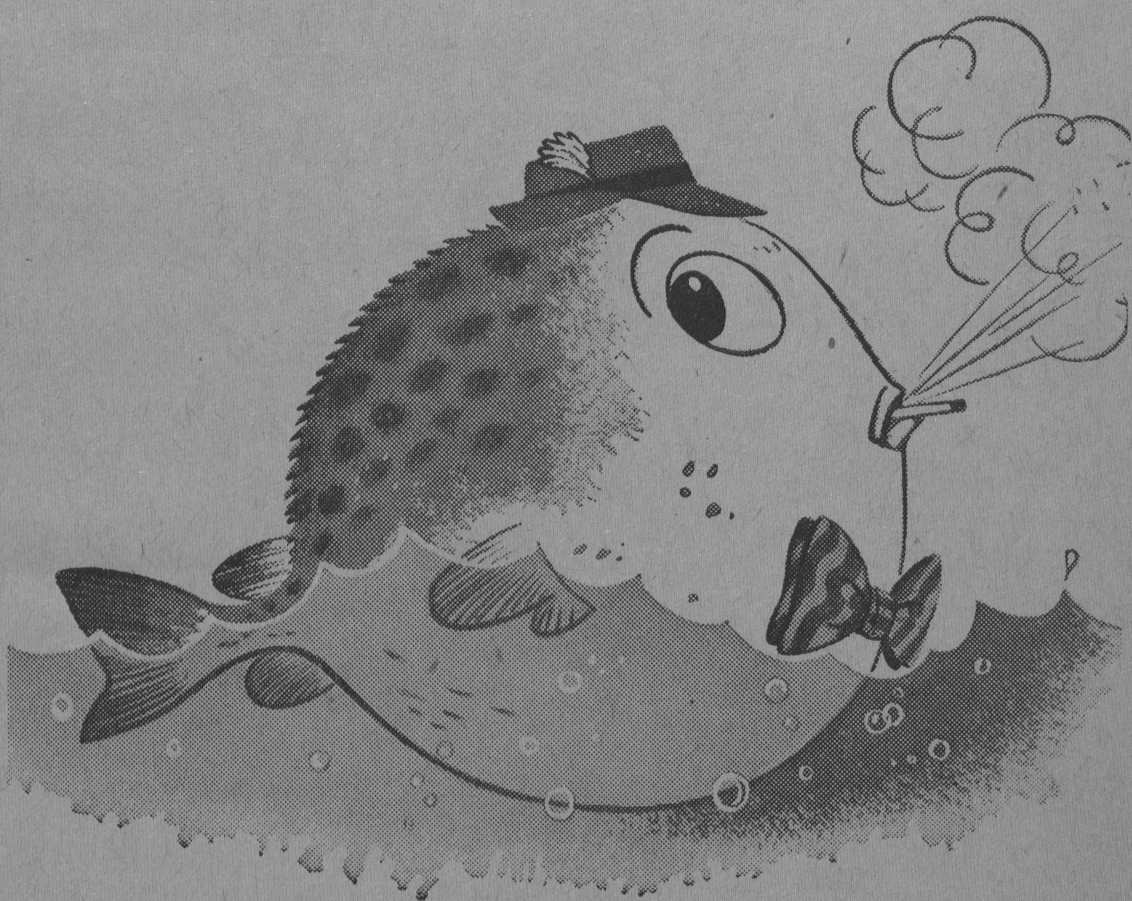
