The poll was deemed so impor tant that the library has made it

"It seems appropriate that this exhibit be presented before and during Public Schools Week because the problems of our day call for the highest leadership. It is the challenge of education to arouse anew students' interest in uch attainments," said McKnight. The political list of seven includes Winston Churchill, General Dwight Eisenhower, Jawaharlal Nehru, George Marshall, Joseph Stalin, Herbert Hoover, General Douglas MacArthur.
Non-political leaders are Albert Schweitzer, Albert Einstein, Robert Frost, John Dewey, Eleanor Roosevelt, Madame Pandit, and Ralph Bunche.
