"Ike" named best living American

Fourteen people were named the greatest living persons in a poll conducted by the Saturday Review of Literature among its readers.

The poll was deemed so important that the library has made it the theme of an exhibit, according to Eugene McKnight, assistant librarian. "It seems appropriate that this exhibit be presented before and during Public Schools Week because the problems of our day call for the highest leadership. . . . It is the challenge of education to arouse anew students' interest in such attainments," said McKnight.

The political list of seven includes Winston Churchill, General Dwight Eisenhower, Jawaharlal Nehru, George Marshall, Joseph Stalin, Herbert Hoover, General Douglas MacArthur.

Non-political leaders are Albert Schweitzer, Albert Einstein, Robert Frost, John Dewey, Eleanor Roosevelt, Madame Pandit, and Ralph Bunche.

Eisenhower was chosen as the "greatest living American". Many votes were cast for the American G.I.

Time problems aired by panel

"The Problems of Leisure in the Present National Emergency" will be the topic of a group of experts in the field next Wednesday in H. H. 6 at 1 p.m.

The panel includes George Hjelte, Phillip L. Seman, Beatrice Guzik and George Stephenson. Dr. Floyd Eastwood will be the moderator.

Mr. Hjelte is the General Manager of the Los Angeles Recreation and Park Department and the past president of the American Recreation Society.

Phillip L. Seman is the honorary chairman of the Chicago Recreation Commission and has been active as a social worker for many years.

Beatrice Guzik is a City College student majoring in recreation. She has worked extensively in day camps during the summer.

George Stephenson is a lawyer and an executive at 20th Century-Fox.

In a statement on recreation, Hjelte said, "Recreation agencies, like all others, must today review their programs carefully . . . to make sure that they are doing their share of the work."

Faculty publicizes State via airwaves

Irvin Borders, Director of Publicity for State College, announced recently that a series of interviews on 15-minute radio transcriptions has been undertaken by the Radio Committee of the Faculty Association, in an effort to make State College and its faculty more widely and better known.

The first transcription has already been made under the direction of Hal Hodge, who expects to place the programs on a Los Angeles station when enough transcriptions have been completed. The series will be called, "What Do You Think?"

Some of the programs, the committee explained, will be semi-contrivertial; others will be reports of activities or research. Subject matter runs the gamut from alternate work-study to vocation adjustment.

Future looks bright for engineer grads.

Four-year graduates with engineering training who are aiming for top level jobs in engineering will find the field wide open, according to the Department of Engineering.

Los Angeles State College has received many inquiries and demands from industry for the training of young men. These inquiries and demands come from the field of production, processing and packaging, transportation, power production, construction, operation, sales, and management. Because of

this, State in conjunction with City College, has developed a four-year curriculum leading to a Bachelor of Science degree.

Students are encouraged to enroll concurrently in the work-study program to gain practice experience, theory, and laboratory work taken concurrently or alternately with college work.

"Traditionally, engineers are classified into general fields," said C. W. Duncan of the Engineering Department, "These are chemical, civil, electrical, mechanical and mining, but actually the work of the engineers is more on a functional basis. The courses offered in the department form as basic or core curriculum which covers engineering fields.

"The work is directed toward enabling the graduate to be of service to industry in production, construction, design, testing, operation, maintenance, installation, or sales, which close liaison with local industry shows to be its greatest need at the present."

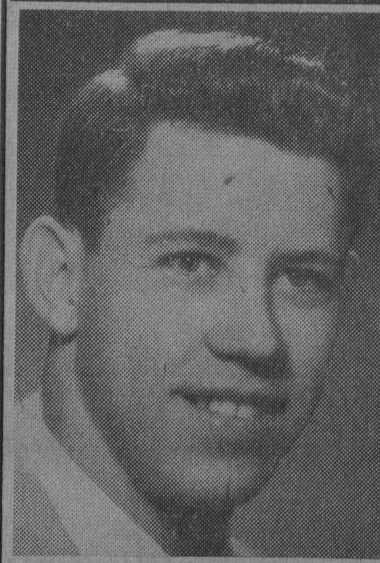

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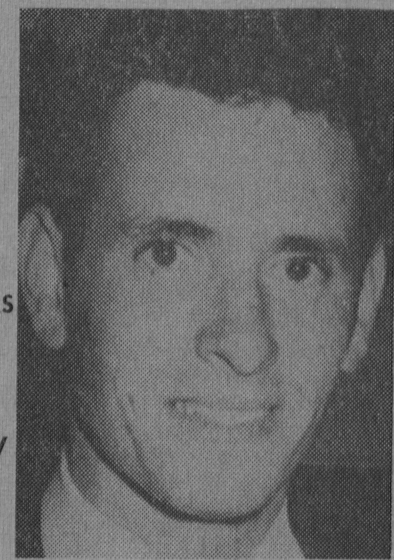
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
