Coach Sax Elliot's, fighting L.-A. State College quintet, played a rude host to seven other cage five's as the Diablos upset the pre-tourney favorite, the Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo, Mustangs 59-52 to walk off with top honors in the first annual California State College Tournament held December 19-21 in the local gym.

In the opening round of play the Elliotmen proved the master of Cal Poly of San Dimas 73-42. Everybody scored at least two points with Bill McNaught pacing the victors with 12.

In the semifinals the next night, the Devils drew the big Sacramento State Hornets conquerors of Humbolt State 73-35 in. the first round. It was here that

L.A.'s Dick Green turned in his best performance to-date and paced the locals to a hard fought 62-52 win. The 6'4 center limited burly 230 pound, 6'4 Hornet pivotman Al McKayden to a lone bucket and his replacement Jack Sarvis to four free throws. On top of this Green had red in eyes and bucketed 20 pts. Marv Gurian turned in a top floor game and hit for 13 markers. The two teams were deadlocked 27 all at the halftime buzzer, but the locals really caught fire as a unit and won going away from the Northern-ers. Regis "I'm really only 30 year's old" Hurley led the Capitol City attack with a dozen plus

The night of December 21 was a great one for Coach Sax Elliot, his 12 Diablo cagers and for L.A. State College, as the Vermont Avenue entry prepared to vie against Coach Ed Jorgenson's classy Cal Poly cagers.

Faculty commence student advisement

When you meet with your adviser he will assist you in making out a program for the next term. The adviser has your permit to register and you must have his signature if you intend to take more than 5 units in day classes next term. The adviser will sign your permit (which will also bear the list of approved courses you select and return it to the Registrar. You can pick it up at Station I during registration.
